Hello everyone, my name is Mukai. I assumed the position of chief of the Planning and Promotion Section in April. Until now, I have worked in school education and social studies education. In the course of that work, I had opportunities to think about support for residents from abroad in Japan and multicultural coexistence, but it stopped at a surface level.

OFIX has been working hard to fulfill its role as a center promoting multicultural coexistence over the past five years. Based on what was accomplished during this time, we have formulated a new midterm management plan for the next five years. 

2022 Report for the Osaka Information Service for Foreign Residents

In 2022, the number of people from abroad living in Osaka reached a record high. Combined with the impact of the spread of COVID-19, the number of consultations also reached a record high of 2,648 cases. The pandemic entered its third year and the number of COVID-19-related consultations increased sharply due to the sixth wave from the end of 2021 to the early spring of 2022. This continued with the record seventh wave from early summer to autumn. However, the peak of the 8th wave was not as high, and with the decision to shift COVID-19 to a class five disease, COVID-19-related consultations have now calmed down (Fig. 1).

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine that began in February 2022, we took consultations regarding people displaced from Ukraine (Fig. 2). We also began to provide services in Russian and Ukrainian, and received many consultations from companies, organizations, and individuals who are supporting the reception of Ukrainians. We also received consultations from Ukrainians who had actually already arrived in Japan.

What surprised me the most when I came to Osaka was how warm the people are. I was worried about whether I would be able to make Japanese friends, as Japanese people are often said to be distant. However, when I arrived in Osaka, I had many good experiences with Osakajin. My classmates always naturally started talking to me and even though we had just met, they would invite me to do things together. When I go to izakaya, the owners always talk to me with friendly smiles. Once, when I was eating at a restaurant, a guy next to me told me about his experiences in China, and we ended up taking pictures together. I consider it an amazing experience to have lived in Osaka and met and made friends with so many interesting people.

Hello everyone! My name is Cheng Shiyin, and I am from China. This is my fifth year in Japan. I am currently studying at a Japanese university. My hobbies are cooking and traveling.

Were there any problems you faced when you came to Osaka?

One of the problems in Osaka is that the streets are narrow. In many places, there is only one lane for pedestrians and bikes, so you have to ride very carefully.

How do you feel about being a supporter?

Becoming a supporter has given me a deeper sense of the value of culture and self-worth. I was worried that the children might not be interested in Chinese culture and that I would not be able to convey what I wanted to say to them in my poor Japanese at first. However, I was encouraged by the children's reactions at every school I visited. They actively asked questions and participated in the class, and in the feedback written by the children after the class, they said things like "I became interested in China from this class," "Shiyin-san's Japanese is easy to understand, and the class is fun," etc. Receiving such words, I became more and more confident that my culture was recognized by many different people.



Shiyin's recommended: Tomato and Egg Stir-fry

Tomato and egg stir-fry is a traditional home-style dish in China, much like *Nikujyaga* in Japan. Its simple preparation and sweet and sour taste is so perfect served with noodles and rice. This makes it a popular dish in all regions of China.

Ingredients:

- 3 eggs
- 2 medium tomatoes
- 1 clove of garlic
- A few chopped green onions
- 1 g salt
- 2 g sugar
- A little oyster sauce
- A little cooking oil

Recipe:

- Wash tomatoes, peel and de-stem in freshly boiling water, slice and set aside.
- 2 Beat the eggs in a bowl with a bit of salt and stir well with chopsticks for 30 seconds.
- 3 Heat oil in a frying pan over high heat, quickly pour the egg mixture into the pan and stir gently, then scramble the eggs and place it on a plate.
- 4 Heat more oil, fry the tomatoes, add a little garlic and fry for a few more minutes, add the eggs from 3 and fry for a bit longer.
- **3** After mixing the eggs with the tomato, add salt, sugar and a little oyster sauce. Finally, fry just a little more lightly to finish. Sprinkle with chopped green onions before serving!


