An OFIX staff from the Uyghur region of China gave a class in English to high school students at Osaka Prefectural Akutagawa High School. She commented, "I was nervous in my first class, but I told the students that

it is important to communicate actively even if English is not their first language, and that it is fun to be able to speak different languages." The students were also surprised to learn that the Uyghur word for "thank you" (Rahmat sizge) is used everywhere in Central Asia.


Introduction of Orion International House

Orion International House is an international student dormitory operated by OFIX. Located in Sakai City, there currently are 76 students (as of June 1, 2023) residing in the dorm. Single international students who are enrolled in a university or other institution in Osaka Prefecture and who are having difficulty finding a place to live may apply to live in the dormitory.

The Lives of International Students in Japan



What are the top 3 places international students living in Osaka Prefecture come from?

In 2022, the top three places that international students living in Osaka Prefecture came from were Asia, Europe and North America. Of the students from Asia, the largest number were from China, followed by Vietnam and Nepal. (From Osaka Prefectural Government, "Number of International Students in Osaka Prefecture 2022" data)



When international students want to work part-time, they need to apply in advance!

When you go to a convenience store or restaurant, do you sometimes see international students working? Since the status of residence for international students is "Student," they must spend most of their time learning at a school, but they can work part-time if they apply for "Permission to engage in an activity other than those permitted by the status of residence (資格外活動許可)." However, maximum working hours are limited to 28 hours per week.

Point 2

How do international students find a place to live?

When renting a room in Japan, it is necessary to find a guarantor, but it is often very difficult for international students who have only lived in Japan for a short time to find one. For this reason, many students use university dormitories or use a guarantor company to rent an apartment.



After graduation, foreign students can stay in Japan and engage in job hunting activities with a special status of residence!

After graduation, if an international student wishes to remain in Japan and continue job hunting, he/she can change his/her status of residence to "Designated Activities" (特定活動). The period of stay is 6 months, and the maximum stay is 1 year.






What is your favorite Japanese word?
